
Which people are you particularly thankful for in your life? Why are you thankful for them?

- 2. Why are Paul, Silas, and Timothy thankful for the church in Thessalonica?
- 3. In v.3, what causes the Thessalonians to work, labour and endure?
- 4. In vv.4 & 7, how did the Thessalonians receive and welcome the gospel?
- 5. When Paul, Silas, and Timothy were originally in Thessalonica during Paul's second missionary journey, they and the first members of the church there were persecuted and suffered. Read Acts 17:1-9. What happened to them?
- 6. For a small, persecuted church a long way from Jerusalem, how do you think they felt to know that they are a model for all believers and that their faith is known everywhere?
- 7. In vv.9-10, what do we know about the believers in Thessalonica?

- 4. What do vv.8-12 tell us about how Paul conducted his ministry?
- 5. How can this passage inform and shape the way we serve and lead people in church?

Read: 1 Thessalonians 2:13-20

- 1. How does Paul feel about the Thessalonians? How have they received the word of God?
- 2. What has happened to the people since they became Christians?
- 3. What does Paul long for in vv.17-19?
- 4. What does this passage show us about the importance of relationships in the church today?
- 5. How can this passage teach us to discern the difference between the true Gospel and a gospel peddled for profit?
- 6. How are we to respond to opposition to the Christian faith today?


Has there ever been a time when you were worried about someone but couldn't go see them? How did you feel?

- 7. How might the Thessalonians' steadfastness in the face of persecution apply to challenges we face today?
- 8. How might Paul's joy over the Thessalonians' faith encourage us in our spiritual journey?
- 9. How can the Thessalonians' perseverance inspire Christians facing challenges today?
- 10.In vv.11-13, what did Paul pray would grow and prosper among the Thessalonians?

- 2. Why is it important that Paul's instructions about Christian living come by the authority of Jesus?
- 3. What does it mean to be sanctified?
- 4. In vv.3-7, what reasons does Paul give for avoiding sexual immorality?
- 5. In vv.9, who taught the Thessalonians to love each other? What else does he encourage them to do?
- 6. In vv.11-12, what does Paul say that their ambition should be? Why?

Read: 1 Thessalonians 4:13-18

- 1. Why shouldn't the Thessalonians grieve those who have died?
- 2. How would you summarise Paul's explanation of Jesus' return in vv.14-17?
- 3. What encouragement would these words give to believers?

- 2. What analogies does Paul use for the 'day of the Lord'?
- 3. What are some of the contrasts drawn in vv.4-11? What are we being told about how we should live?

Read: 1 Thessalonians 5: 12-28

- 1.In these final verses Paul gives words of encouragement. How many encouragements can you find?
- 2. Who are vv.12-14 about? What does this mean for us today?
- 3. What are the parallels between Jesus' teaching and Paul's? (see Matthew 5:43-48; Mark 12:30-31; Luke 6:27-36; John 13:34)
- 4. What is Paul teaching about the Holy Spirit and prophecy in vv.19-21? How can we respond when someone says they've heard from God?

Read: 1 Thessalonians 5:23-28

- 1. What do vv.23-28 tell us about how we are to care for each other?
- 2. What is sanctification and what value does it hold for Christians?
- 3.A 'holy kiss' was a form of greeting in the ancient world. How can we greet people in a way that conveys God's love but doesn't freak them out or give them the wrong idea today?

What are some applications that you can take from our 1 Thessalonians series that will help you live in preparation for Jesus' return?
